The Papillion Area Concert Band (PAC Band) was organized in the summer of 1986. Ken Molzer, the founder and director, surveyed the area with the aid of the Papillion Parks and Recreation Department to determine if there were enough interested musicians to form a community band. The response was overwhelming, and the first two concerts were held in the city park that summer. Since that time, enthusiasm has grown. The band not only performs during the summer in the park, but also performs a winter concert in conjunction with the Papillion Lions Club at the Papillion-La Vista High School Auditorium.

A Board of Directors was formed in the spring of 1987. Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws were filed as a Non-Profit Corporation in the State of Nebraska. It was agreed by members of the Board of Directors that the purpose of the PAC Band would be to promote, encourage and increase the knowledge, appreciation and practice of the art of instrumental music. There are no auditions for membership, which is open to any musician beyond high school who enjoys playing band music. Rehearsals are normally once per month, with extra rehearsals prior to a concert, as needed.

"Community" is the operative word for the Iowa Western Community Band, now in its 41st year of bringing music to Iowans and Nebraskans and providing a performance organization for people of all ages who love to play music.

Formed in the winter of 1977-78 by Dr. Arthur Hansuld, professor of music at Iowa Western Community College, the organization has performed in parks, malls, schools, nursing homes, the Historic Dodge House, parades and other venues in the region, including one Interstate 80 rest stop.

Performance locations include Omaha, Elkhorn, South City, Clarinda, Boone, Glenwood, Des Moines, Woodbine, Sioux City and Maryville, Missouri.

Dr. Hansuld directed the group until he moved to Florida in 1985. Other former directors include Fred Glasburner, Carter Leeka, Nate Simmons, Eric Johnson and Bruce Bartels. Subgroups over the years have included a Big Band, a wind ensemble and even a pep band.

The 1st Nebraska Volunteers Brass Band is a 15-member musical ensemble providing living history, education and musical entertainment in Nebraska and surrounding areas. The group portrays the band of the original 1st Nebraska Volunteer Infantry Regiment of 1861-1862. 1st Nebraska wears Union infantry uniforms and plays authentic musical arrangements from Civil War band books.

The band performs for community events, festivals, and museums to keep alive the wonderful heritage of Civil War music and brass bands. Performances includes a narration that describes the music the audience is hearing and relates details of soldiering during the Civil War. Our music includes patriotic tunes of the North and the South, songs by popular composers of the day, well-known opera pieces, and marches and quicksteps.

The band is led by Bill Hall, founder and retired conductor of Omaha Symphonic Winds and director of bands at Dana College from 1997-2006. Hall holds three degrees in music and is a former member of the United States Army Band in Washington, D.C., (Pershing's Own) and the United States Army Field Band (Musical Ambassadors of the Army).

As the State of Nebraska and area communities celebrate their collective histories, the 1st Nebraska Volunteers Brass Band provides a living reminder of those bygone days when local militia and town bands were a part of the vital fabric of society supporting community events and frequently playing concerts in the town square. The mission of Omaha Symphonic Winds is to enrich the community with the heritage of great band compositions and to promote the future of band literature. We provide an opportunity for the community to hear outstanding musical compositions in a live setting, furnish an outlet for adult musicians to perform quality music, motivate music students through joint concert performances, commission and premiere new works, and serve the community with outreach events.

As of October 2015, the Omaha Symphonic Winds is led by a board of directors. Following Bill Hall as Music Director were Mr. Ron Hardin and Mr. Byron Braasch. The group is now lead by Mr. Rex Barker, current Director of Instrumental Music at Midland University in Fremont and Sales Representative for Fruhauf Uniform. He has 33 years of experience as a band director at Grand Island Northwest and Millard South High Schools. Rex served two terms as President of the Nebraska Music Education Association and one as President of Nebraska State Bandmasters Association. He was also Director of Performing Arts at Midland University and brings years of experience and knowledge to the Omaha Symphonic Winds. The Omaha Symphonic Winds rehearses at Liberty Middle School in Papillion and performs on a regular basis at St. Paul's Methodist Church in Papillion, Nebraska. The musicians of OSW are drawn from area band directors, music teachers, retired military musicians and area professionals.

This virtuoso group of active duty Airmen performs a range of musical styles spanning five centuries. Whether a military march, jazz standard, classical favorite or an original arrangement of patriotic selections, each Offutt Brass program blends inspiration and entertainment.

As professional Airmen, the United States Air Force Heartland of America Band members share the message of excellence, courage and commitment displayed every day by the brave men and women of the United States Air Force serving throughout the world.

Offutt Brass was featured musical group at the 2018 Nebraska Educators Association convention held in Lincoln last March. In 2017, group members performed with the USAF Total Force Band at the Rose Bowl Parade in Pasadena, California, and took part in multiple presidential inaugural events in Washington, D.C.

The United States Air Force Heartland of America Band began as the 402nd Army Air Force Band in 1943 at Ardmore Army Base, Oklahoma. Later assigned to Andrews Field in Maryland and Selfridge Air Force Base in Michigan, it came to the Strategic Air Command at Offutt on Oct. 2, 1948. In 1992, the band was renamed the United States Air Force Heartland of America Band


