

Welcome to the final formal concert of the 47th Season of the Nebraska Wind Symphony. The Offutt Brass joins us in our performance of a wonderful arrangement of some highlights of Bernstein's "Mass." A theater piece for singers, players and dancers, it was composed by Leonard Bernstein with text by Bernstein and additional text and lyrics by Stephen Schwartz. Commissioned by Jacqueline Kennedy, it premiered on September 8, 1971, at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. Sit back and enjoy!

Tonight also is the final performance of the first Regional Connections Event held by the Association of Concert Bands. Friday evening the UNO Symphonic Wind Ensemble, directed by Joshua Kearney, performed. Earlier today there were performances by the Omaha Symphonic Winds, directed by Rex Barker, and the Central Iowa Wind Ensemble, with Christian Carichner, Director. Instead of the previous once-a-year nationwide meetings, the Association of Concert Bands is holding the Midwest Regional Event in Omaha, followed by Regional Connections Events June 14-15 in Plano/Richardson, Texas, and September 20-21 in Carrolton, Georgia.

The Regional Connections Events bring bands and musicians from a region together for collaboration, education, performance and discussion. As you may have experienced here in Omaha, the Events include participatory music reading sessions, roundtables and other education discussions, networking opportunities and ACB Member Band performances.

The regional meetings are new, but the Association's mission continues to be fostering excellence in Concert Band music through performance, education and advocacy. Members of the Association include community concert bands, such as those today's audiences have seen here at the University of Nebraska at Omaha, as well as band directors, individual members and corporate members.

Thank you for being here, and check out all the information in this program. The NWS owes much of its success to the ability to involve the young people of the area, and you can read about our scholarship program, our annual "Middle School All-Stars" concert, our "Big Band," the Swingtones, our free summer concerts and our volunteers and supporters, which can include you!

Omaha and the many Musicians of Offutt AFB

We in the Omaha area are fortunate to have a fine military musical organization stationed at Offutt Air Force Base in Bellevue: The United States Air Force Heartland of America Band. Five of its members -- playing French horn, trombone, tuba and two trumpers -- make up the Offutt Brass.

The Heartland of America Band's heritage dates to its formation on February 1, 1943, in Oklahoma. After assignments in Maryland and Michigan, the Band was assigned to Offutt on October 2, 1948, as the Strategic Air Command Band. With the end of the Cold War, the nation's nuclear arsenal shifted to the U.S. Strategic Command on August 1, 2013. The Band was reassigned to the USAF Heritage of America Band in Virginia but remains at Offutt.

The missions of today's 15-member ensemble includes a wide range of domestic performances and deployments in collaboration with U.S. Embassies to share American culture, build partnerships, advance international relationships and use music to motivate and unify coalition service members who are defending the nation.

NWS Director **Dr. Joshua Kearney**

Joshua Kearney is Assistant Professor and Director of Bands at the University of Nebraska at Omaha where he teaches courses in music education and conducting, conducts the Symphonic Wind Ensemble, and oversees all aspects of the UNO band program. In addition to his duties at UNO, Dr. Kearney serves as Music Director of the Nebraska Wind Symphony. Kearney began his career as a teacher in the public schools south of Nashville, Tennessee.

Dr. Kearney has worked as an adjudicator and clinician for ensembles of all levels—maintaining an active guest conducting schedule locally and across the United States. Kearney regularly shares his research and experiences through conference presentations, lectures, and workshops

around the country including: multiple state music conferences, the State University of New York at New Paltz, the Millard and Omaha Public Schools, College Music Society (CMS) regional and national conferences, conferences of the College Band Directors National Association (CBDNA), the Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago, and the World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles (WASBE) conference in Prague. Under Kearney's direction, both the Nebraska Wind Symphony and the UNO Symphonic Wind Ensemble have been selected as featured ensembles at the annual Nebraska Music Educators Association in-service conference.

An advocate of new music, Kearney often works with composers in the creation and performance of new works for winds. His direct efforts have contributed to pieces by Keith Davis, Catherine Likhuta, Giovanni Santos, Scott Boerma, Donald Grantham, Steven Bryant, Anthony O'Toole, Joseph Schwantner, and others. Dr. Kearney is an active editor and arranger, having provided music for the UNO Symphonic Wind Ensemble, the Columbus State University Wind Ensemble and Trombone Choir, the Southeast Trombone Symposium Professors Choir, the Springer Opera House (GA), and many selections for athletic bands. In 2020, Boosey & Hawkes announced plans to include Kearney's educational edition of Georg Druschetzky's *Partita No. IV* within their acclaimed Windependence Chamber Ensemble series. In 2017, Boosey & Hawkes also published Kearney's critical edition of Emil Hartmann's *Serenade for Winds* (Op. 43) which is regularly featured in prominent conducting symposia throughout the United States. Additionally, Presser Music has included Dr. Kearney's transcription of Charles Ives' *Variations on 'America'* for trombone choir within their catalog—receiving its premiere at the 2021 International Trombone Festival by the Southeast Trombone Symposium Professors Choir.

Kearney earned the Doctor of Musical Arts in Conducting from Michigan State University where he studied with Kevin Sedatole and master's and bachelor's degrees from Columbus State University (GA) where he was a student of Jamie L. Nix. Kearney holds affiliations with the Nebraska State Bandmasters Association, the Nebraska Music Educators Association, the National Association for Music Education, the College Music Society, the World Association for Symphonic Bands and Ensembles, and the College Band Directors National Association. Kearney has served on the Executive Board for the Nebraska State Bandmasters Association and in multiple leadership roles on committees within the College Band Directors National Association.

NWS Associate Director Keith Michael Davis

Associate Director Keith Davis is a native of Kansas City, Missouri and has made Omaha his home since 1991. He received his Bachelor of Music in Composition (1988) and Master of Music in Horn Performance (1990) from the University of Missouri- Kansas City Conservatory of Music. He has composed music for many instrumental ensembles, but has written mainly for symphonic and concert bands. His commissioned works include A Western Plains Overture, Native Hunters, delicate survivors of life's mighty storms and Bastion of Freedom. Keith has also made special arrangements for the Wind Symphony,



including a transcription of Ravel's Mother Goose Suite, an arrangement of Amazing Grace for band and bagpipes and several holiday selections. Keith has been a playing member of the Nebraska Wind Symphony since 1992 and also serves as Music Librarian. Keith frequently directs the Nebraska Wind Symphony, including the Making Spirits Bright concert on Thanksgiving Day at the Holland Performing Arts Center. He also plays principal horn with Orchestra Omaha and performed the Richard Strauss 1st Horn Concerto with them in 2019. Keith lives in Gretna with his wife, oboist Deanna Davis, and their pets.

Guest Conductor Don Jacobson

Don Jacobson is a charter member of the Nebraska Wind Symphony. A graduate of Central High and UNL, Don taught instrumental music in Pierre, SD and Wausa, NE, and in Millard for 27 years. Currently, Don is conductor of the Iowa Western Community Band and plays alto sax in the Omaha Symphonic Winds and NWS.

Guest Organist Mark Kurtz

Mark Kurtz is a composer, pianist, organist, and music director. Originally from North Dakota, he has lived and worked in Omaha since 2000. He has become known for being adept in an unusually broad spectrum of genres, including both art music and popular music. A sought-after performer and inventive creator, his work can be found in concert halls, churches, theaters, cabarets, and convention centers.

Besides being the music director at First United Methodist Church (Omaha) and Associate Director and Collaborative Pianist for Résonance (a professional choral ensemble), he has worked locally with many organizations such as the Omaha Symphony, Opera Omaha, and The Omaha Chamber Music Society; he has also performed at regional, national, and international festivals, including the national convention of the American Guild of Organists in 2018 and the



international GALA choral festival in 2008. He frequently receives commissions for new work, from organizations such as the Institute for Holocaust Education (2021), Résonance (2020 and 2016), Gallup (2019, 2018, 2017, and 2016), the Willa Cather Foundation (2017), the Anti Defamation League (2012), Why Arts (2011), and the River City Mixed Chorus (2014 and 2008). He has received numerous scholastic, performance, and composition awards, most recently being named winner of the 2018 AGO/Marilyn Mason Award in Organ Composition.

2024 NWS

The Nebraska Wind Symphony was founded in 1977 by Darwyn "Tony" Snyder. Since then there have been many contributors to its growth and success, both as musicians and as leaders. The Board of Directors determined in June of 2009 that it was time to honor and celebrate the legacy of those whose contributions have helped shape and grow the Wind Symphony.

And thus, the Nebraska Wind Symphony Hall of Fame was born!

Steve Jordon followed his wife, French horn player Helen, when he joined the Nebraska Wind Symphony in the early 1980s. He has served as an officer and board member and is a member of the development committee. He also is a long-time drummer for the NWS-affiliated Swingtones.

Steve also plays percussion in the Blair Community Band and has played with other musical groups since arriving in Nebraska in 1962 with his Air Force family, including the Cornhusker Marching Band and its Alumni Band, the Megatones, the Dahee, Celery Man and Monkey Funk rock groups, the Omaha Press Club Royal Festival Orchestra, Orchestra Omaha, the Council Bluffs, Papillion and Omaha community theaters, Shamrock & Kolache, the Prospect Hill Preservation Society Band and (once) Luigi Inc.

He was a reporter and editor with The Omaha World-Herald for 51 years and writes articles for Omaha Magazine, the Nebraska Examiner and other publications. He has written books on Berkshire Hathaway, Duncan Aviation, Scooter's Coffee, Lord of Love Lutheran Church and Boyd Jones. Steve and Helen's family members are Leland and wife Jin, Ingrid and husband Brandon and granddaughter Mabel Thaden.

Deb Lund

Deb grew up on a farm near Arlington, SD. She started playing saxophone in 6th grade, going to town from country school for lessons and band class with

the legendary Bob King. She graduated from Arlington High School, then Augustana University, Sioux Falls, SD, with a BA in music education and a minor in Spanish. She taught music in two small towns in South Dakota, before joining a new band program, Music in Catholic Schools for the Omaha Archdiocese in 1979. She was the MCS Administrator, in addition to some teaching, from 1982 until she retired in August, 2020.

Her husband Brian has a music education degree, is a retired IT engineer, and plays trombone with NWS. They have 3 adult children, all married, and all play wind Rebecca, an ELCA pastor, and instruments. her husband Rich live in Long Island, NY, with their two daughters, Erin and Grace. Andrew and his wife Andreea, both software engineers, live in Lørenskog, Norway with their 21-monthold son Mark. Josh, instrument repair specialist, and wife Shelby live in Omaha. In addition to music activities, she volunteers at Lakeside Hospital and Nebraska Cancer Specialists, is active at her church, gardens, walks, bakes, and keeps busy with home projects.

Ralston, Nebraska, native Rebecca Shively began playing trumpet in 5th grade and, in 2001, was a member of the NWS All-Star high school trumpet



players. She graduated from Ralston High School and earned Master's and Doctoral degrees from the University of Nebraska at Omaha in Industrial/Organizational Psychology. She currently works for Farm Credit Services of America, designing education for farmers and ranchers.

Despite her non-music major, she was a member of UNO's Marching Mavericks, University Concert Band, Jazz Ensemble and Maverick Horns Pep Band, holding leadership positions in the Kappa Iota chapter of Kappa Kappa Psi, National Honorary Band Fraternity.

Rebecca served six years on the NWS Board of Directors and continues to volunteer on the Development Committee, responsible for writing grants. She has written over a dozen successful grant applications totaling more than \$20,000 in support for the NWS.

Rebecca lives in Elkhorn with her fiancé, Nick. Together, they enjoy home renovation projects, cooking, hiking, golf, and spending time with family and friends. They also enjoy attending band performances of her two nieces, Kennedy, and Delaney, who play baritone and clarinet, respectively.
